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2018 Highlights

Yukon Delta Fisheries Development Association

(YDFDA) is celebrating 26 years of service to our residents. Over the years our CDQ quota has translated into investment opportunities both inside and outside the region, allowing us to provide tangible benefits to our member residents.

Kwikpak Fisheries buys salmon from Yukon Delta residents providing economic opportunities for both fishermen and processing plant workers. Yukon Marine Manufacturing (YMM) employs local welders to build and repair boats for Yukon Delta residents.

Yukon River Towing (YRT) began operating in 2010 hauling gravel and rock throughout the Yukon Delta region. It has since expanded to building construction and employs local residents in and near their home villages. Our Youth Employment Program (YEP) provides summer employment opportunities to students between the ages of 14 and 17.

Kwikpak Fisheries was once again the major buyer on the Lower Yukon for the 2018 salmon season. Kwikpak Fisheries purchased 4,822,581 pounds of salmon infusing \$3,471,294 into the pockets of 457 fishermen and their families.

Kwikpak Fisheries employed 624 residents with wages of \$4,372,040. This included employment of 173 students ranging in age from 14–17 in the Youth Employment Project with wages of \$375,363.

In 2018 YDFDA was awarded a grant from the State of Alaska, Department of Labor Workforce Investment And Opportunity Act to partially fund our Youth Employment Project. The YEP Project is highly successful. We have received this grant seven out of the last eight years.

Residents working onboard Bering Sea fishing vessels totaled 33 with wages of \$473,893.

YDFDA assisted the Alaska Department of Fish and Game (ADF&G) by providing funding for various projects in 2018. Local technicians were hired to assist ADF&G in Emmonak, Middle Mouth, and Big Eddy with projects which included the summer chum and Chinook test nets and sampling, followed by the fall chum and coho test fishing and sampling. Testing was conducted using fyke and hoop nets for efficiently catching lamprey.

YDFDA assisted the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Association (NOAA) in a juvenile salmon outmigration project that identified the amount of Chinook and other smolt leaving the mouths of the Yukon after breakup.

YDFDA assisted **23** residents with employment assistance funding totaling \$62,812.

Kwikpak Fisheries purchased cisco from 19 local fishermen who landed 30,987 pounds at a value to fishermen of \$46,480. Working in conjunction with ACME Smoked Fish of Brooklyn, NY, Kwikpak has built up a





specialty market for this unique product. Market demand for Yukon River cisco far exceeds the current allowable harvest. We continue to work with ADF&G to increase the allowable harvest.

Kwikpak Fisheries purchased 10,491 furs from 263 trappers at a value to trappers of \$918,495. Kwikpak is now the largest raw fur buyer in the State of Alaska.

In 2018, Yukon Marine Manufacturing completed fabrication of 46 new skiffs.

In addition, numerous repairs and modifications were done for residents on existing skiffs. 17 local residents were employed at Yukon Marine Manufacturing with wages totaling \$457,089. 42 skiffs were sold in 2018.

Yukon River Towing (YRT) provided jobs for 70 regional residents with wages of \$2,300,504.

YDFDA's scholarship program awarded scholarships to 51 students attending both

universities and vocational institutions. Scholarships awarded amounted to \$190,682.

In 2018 1,447 YDFDA residents took advantage of employment opportunities made available through YDFDA and subsidiaries. This resulted in wages of \$11,865,809 going back to the communities.

In 2018 YDFDA sponsored numerous fishermen, both subsistence and commercial, to attend and testify at the Federal Subsistence Board, Alaska Board of Fisheries, Yukon River Panel, Yukon River Drainage Fishermen's Association, Yukon River Inter-Tribal Fish Commission, and North Pacific Fisheries Management Council meetings. Fishermen provided input on matters of concern to the lower river.

Since 2000 YDFDA has partnered with the Alaska Business Development Center, Inc. sponsoring the Volunteer Tax and Loan Program (VTLP). The program assists taxpayers in YDFDA communities at no charge with the completion of their tax returns and provides them with taxpayer education. In 2018, 824 residents were assisted with their tax returns in the communities of Alakanuk, Emmonak, Kotlik, Mountain Village, and Nunam Iqua. \$1,058,978 in tax refunds was returned to our local taxpayers. Grayling is served by Tanana Chiefs Conference and its partnership with ABDC, Inc.

YDFDA assisted five residents with the purchase of salmon permits.



We are excited about the future and look forward to 2019 as the Board of Directors and administration explore more opportunities to provide community and economic development benefits to our residents and the entire Lower Yukon region.

KWIKPAK Fisheries, LLC



SALMON

2018 marked the 16th consecutive year of operation for Kwikpak Fisheries on the Lower Yukon.

During the 2018 season, Kwikpak's operations included the processing facility in Emmonak, an icing station in Kotlik, and the buying/icing barge in Mountain Village.

In 2018 the majority of product was processed in Emmonak which included fresh fish sales of both fillets and H&G and frozen fillets and H&G. Kwikpak branded product was shipped directly to customers in the lower forty-eight and Europe.

457 fishermen delivered 4,822,581 pounds of salmon in 2018. The total earnings to fishermen and their families was \$3,471,294.


Kwikpak continued to promote wild Yukon River salmon world-wide. Kwikpak has maintained a reputation for high quality demonstrated by sales and distribution in Japan, the United Kingdom, and several other Western European countries. We are dedicated to aggressively producing and marketing the highest quality salmon enabling us to provide the greatest economic benefit possible to our residents.

Economic gains to fishermen are clearly evident. Ex-vessel prices






KWIKPAK SALMON PURCHASES — POUNDS / DOLLARS



From 2011 to 2016, all salmon purchases were chum, coho, or sockeye salmon. King salmon was purchased again in 2017 in limited quantities.

for both Yukon Keta and Coho salmon were among the highest paid to fishermen statewide in 2018.

CISCO

Kwikpak continues to develop markets for fisheries classified as experimental by ADF&G. In 2018 the cisco harvest was once again a success. 19 fishermen delivered 30,987 pounds at a value to fishermen of \$46,480. In order to provide the highest quality, all of the harvest was processed in Emmonak and shipped directly to ACME Smoked Fish of Brooklyn, NY.

LAMPREY

Due to unsafe ice conditions, the lamprey fishery was unsuccessful. We continue to receive interest in this unique fishery which is the only commercial lamprey fishery in U.S. waters.

EMPLOYMENT

In addition to providing a fair market value to the region's fishermen, Kwikpak Fisheries is the largest private employer in the region. Kwikpak Fisheries makes a concentrated effort to recruit workers from within the region to provide beneficial employment opportunities to residents of our member villages. We also recruit on an as needed basis from other Western Alaska villages including Marshall, Pilot Station, Russian Mission, St. Mary's, Hooper Bay, Scammon Bay, Chevak, Mekoryuk, Akiachak, Kalskag, Kasigluk, St. Michael and Stebbins, Tukuksak.

In 2018 Kwikpak hired a total of 624 residents that live within the Lower Yukon/Western Alaska region. These workers had earnings totaling \$4,372,040. Kwikpak is heavily involved in several aspects of the in-region workforce. We exclusively utilize regional administrators for recruitment of all local workers. Job placement and training are prioritized to provide skills to workers from our villages. We have been able to not only train the residents of our region, but also provide them with meaningful jobs. We now have regional workers with jobs in accounting, data entry, heavy equipment operators, commercial refrigeration, documented vessel operations, tug boat crews and captains, electricians, fishery technicians, cooks, store keepers, clerical workers, air cargo, commercial truck drivers, regulatory recorders, seafood technicians, and operating engineers, in addition to our fish processors. We place regional residents in the forefront of all employment policies.


LOCAL KWIKPAK EMPLOYMENT — FISHERMEN





YOUTH EMPLOYMENT PROJECT (YEP)

A key component of our employment and workforce development is the Youth Employment Project (YEP). This program is felt to be the cornerstone in addressing the long-term unemployment issues of our region.

We are very proud of the YEP program which employs youth between the ages of 14 and 17.

In 2018 Kwikpak Fisheries employed 173 students. Total wages earned by the 173 youth employees equaled \$375,363 averaging \$2,170 per student. Youth employees held positions including office assistant, receptionist, cashier, salmon traceability data entry, custodian, roe technicians, fish packing, fish grading, making boxes, and bunkhouse assistant. Youth employees were hired from Nunam Iqua, Alakanuk, Emmonak, Kotlik, and Mountain Village to work at all three Kwikpak stations.

Through their experience working in the YEP program, the youth are building a fundamental foundation for the general workforce and learning to be contributing members of society.

FUR BUYING

Headquartered in Grayling and Kotlik, our fur buying operations continued in earnest during the 2018 season. 10,491 furs







(more than double the number purchased in 2017) were purchased from 263 trappers (more than double the number of trappers participating in 2017). Trappers were paid \$918,495 (more than 3 times the value in 2017). Pelts consisted of beaver, otter, mink, muskrat, lynx, fox,

coyote, wolf, wolverine, marten and weasel. Kwikpak has now firmly established itself as the largest raw fur buyer in the State of Alaska. In addition, our lynx and marten were ranked top grade against lynx and marten trapped nationwide.

Yukon River Towing, LLC



YUKON RIVER TOWING (YRT)

Yukon River Towing, headquartered in Emmonak, AK, was established

in 2010 to provide regional residents with job opportunities

in the construction and maritime fields. Over the last 8 years YRT's accomplishments include large and small commercial projects, building renovations, site work, utility improvements, and fisheries support construction. The barging and towing services are primarily utilized to haul gravel, constructions materials,

and equipment to various construction site locations on the Lower Yukon River.

In late 2017, YRT was awarded the contract with the City of Emmonak's Eastside Water and Sewer Improvements project. The project award of \$5,000,000 employed 39 individuals and is the single largest project to date for YRT. The majority of the construction work was performed during 2018. Other notable projects that were completed during 2018 include the construction of the Kotlik Hamilton Office Building, the Emmonak Airport Culvert Replacement, improvements to the Emmonak Women's Shelter, leveling a building for the Lower Yukon School District, installing a ramp for the Boys & Girls Club, and the painting and completion of the Kotlik Tank Farm building. Additionally, beginning in 2018 YRT employed 19 individuals to construct the 10,000 plus square foot EDA Roe Processing /Office Building in Emmonak which will be utilized by Kwikpak Fisheries beginning in the summer of 2019.

In total, YRT employed 70 individuals from the region with wages totaling \$2,300,504 in 2018. These construction projects assisted to generate jobs and develop skills for local laborers, carpenters, plumbers, mechanics, supervisors, administrative assistants, heavy equipment operators, flaggers, LCM captains, deckhands, cooks, and housekeepers from the Lower Yukon Region. Also, YRT employs









a regional administrative assistant who oversees office operations, assists with project bids, submittals, and supports crew operations throughout the region.

During the 2018 vessel operations season, we are happy to announce that one member of our vessel crew passed the test enabling him to apply for his USCG captains license. The process is ongoing

and takes time, but we hope to see him receive his Merchant Mariners Credentials with Master, Mate and AB endorsements in due time.

YRT's growing success is the result of the hard-working men and women from the Lower Yukon River region. One of YRT's primary goals is to build strong professional relationships that support the economic opportunities to those individuals in and around the region. YRT continues to bid on construction work for the coming year to meet the goal of acquiring meaningful work opportunities that will enhance and build upon employing workers from the YDFDA member communities. Already 2019 is looking to be another busy year.

Yukon Marine Manufacturing, LLC



YUKON MARINE MANUFACTURING SKIFF BUILDING FACILITY (YMM)

YMM is well known in the region for the high quality of their skiffs. In 2018 they were able to complete construction on 46 new skiffs in addition to

numerous repairs to existing skiffs. 42 skiffs were sold in 2018.

17 Yukon Delta residents were employed at the YMM skiff building facility in 2018 with wages of \$457,089. A total of 400 skiffs have been built since the beginning of this program in 1999.



YDFDA's Offshore Investments

Investments In Bering Sea Fish Quota

All of the major fisheries in the Bering Sea are now rationalized, which means that of the total pounds of fish in each fishery that may be caught each year, percentages of this total catch, or quota, is allocated to fishery operators and may be bought and sold. Ownership of such quota by Yukon Delta Fisheries Development Association (YDFDA), in addition to its yearly CDQ allocations, is of primary importance to YDFDA as it allows our boats to fish at full capacity, maximizing their revenue, or allows YDFDA to lease out such quota to other harvesters to generate royalty income.

Since 1999, YDFDA has purchased substantial amounts of Bering Sea pollock, cod, crab, halibut, and black cod quota. For pollock, YDFDA has one of the largest holdings of mothership fleet pollock

quota, which we use on the OCEAN LEADER and the AMERICAN BEAUTY, which then deliver their catch to the GOLDEN ALASKA. For Pacific Cod, YDFDA owns a substantial portion of two Bering Sea Pacific Cod licenses, which is used for harvest aboard the BARANOF, as well as on other cod vessels in the Bering Sea fleet. For crab, YDFDA has made substantial purchases of Bristol Bay Red King Crab, Bering Sea Snow Crab (opilio), and Bering Sea Tanner Crab (Bairdi) quotas in the past few years. It is YDFDA's goal to purchase up to the quota ownership cap in these crab fisheries. The revenue derived from YDFDA's ownership of such quotas in all fisheries is used to support YDFDA's in-region activities, and to further the goal of economic development in our member communities.



AKULURAK, LLC

YDFDA owns 85% of the C/P Courageous, a 180-foot crab/longline catcher processor. This LLC also includes a Bering Sea Pacific Cod license which is used by YDFDA to generate royalty revenues.



ALAKANUK BEAUTY, LLC

YDFI owns 75% of the F/V American Beauty, a 123-foot trawler. American Beauty harvests pollock for the F/V Golden Alaska as well as Pacific whiting. American Beauty provides apprenticeship opportunities for Yukon Delta residents.

EMMONAK LEADER, LLC

YDFI owns 75% of the F/V Ocean Leader, a 120-foot trawler. Ocean Leader harvests pollock for the Golden Alaska as well as Pacific whiting. Ocean Leader provides apprenticeship opportunities for Yukon Delta residents.



KISKA SEA NORTHERN, LLC

YDFI owns 45% of the F/V Kiska Sea, a 125-foot crab catcher vessel. Kiska Sea harvests king, tanner, and opilio crab. Kiska Sea has year-round crew positions available for Yukon Delta residents.



ROMANZOF FISHING COMPANY, LLC

YDFDA owns 41% of the C/P Baranof, a 182-foot crab/cod catcher processor. Baranof harvests and processes CDQ and non-CDQ opilio and red king crab, Pacific cod, and sablefish. Baranof has year-round crew positions available for Yukon Delta residents



GOLDEN ALASKA, LLC

YDFI owns 26.3% of the M/V Golden Alaska. Golden Alaska is a 305-foot pollock and Pacific whiting mother-ship that provides processing positions for Yukon Delta residents.

Jennifer Kameroff lives in Emmonak. She grew up subsistence fishing and has been a commercial crew member since early 2000. She would like our communities to work together to sustain our fisheries and provide opportunities for economic development in our six villages. She joined the YDFDA Board in 2018.



Cyril Okitkun lives in Kotlik. He joined the YDFDA Board in 2017. He is a subsistence and commercial fisherman. He would like to see local leaders trained and empowered by YDFDA to lead the region into the future.



Reynold Okitkun (Papa Joe) lives in Kotlik. He joined the YDFDA Board in 2016. He has been commercial fishing since he was 13. His goal is to work for our local villages to ensure training and employment opportunities continue and to make sure that local residents have a voice on the board.



GROWTH IN NET ASSETS (MILLIONS)



2018 was another successful year for Yukon Delta Fisheries Development Association. The net assets of the company, a measure of the company's net worth, grew by \$882,814 to \$93.2 million. Over the last 18 years the net worth of the company has grown in net assets by \$87.0 million, an outstanding growth of 1400%. The steady growth is outlined on the chart to the left. The company posted another strong operational year with total revenues of \$43.5 million.

TRANSACTION REPORTING

YDFDA reports all contractual relationships over \$40,000 between itself and its directors and officers (and their family members). There were none in 2018.

JOBS AND DRUG TESTING

Pursuant to Article 6, Section 14 of YDFDA's bylaws, a director may not simultaneously hold a full-time position of employment with YDFDA or any of its subsidiaries while serving as a director. Additionally, our bylaws prohibit a director from accepting any employment, compensation, gifts or services of any kind which are being provided in exchange for his or her action or inaction on any matter of YDFDA business. Violations of this provision constitute grounds for removal of a director from the Board of Directors. There were no such activities in 2018.

In 2005, YDFDA adopted a drug testing policy whereby all of its employees, including those of its subsidiaries, are subject to pre-hire drug screening and random drug testing during their term of employment. In addition, all YDFDA directors are subject to drug screening upon election or re-election.

DIRECTOR/EMPLOYEE RELATIONS WITH PROFESSIONAL SERVICE PROVIDERS

YDFDA reports if any officers, directors, or key employees are related by family or business to any of YDFDA's professional service providers. There were no such relationships in 2018.

PENDING LEGAL PROCEEDINGS WITH PAST DIRECTORS

YDFDA reports any pending litigation between itself and any past directors. There is no such pending litigation.
